The Brass Band of the Central California Chapter of the Association of the United States Army will regale registrants with music of the period on Friday the 7th before dinner.

A special showing of Shenandoah with Jimmy Stewart will be presented in the barely a year old theater/auditorium of the Veterans Memorial Building on Friday the 7th at 9 pm.

An optional tour on Saturday the 8th from 9 am to noon features a tour of the Fresno home of Dr. Meux (portrayed by Charles Baley), an assistant surgeon in the 9th Tennessee Vol. Inf. (C.S.A.) who moved to Fresno after losing his slaves and other valuables as a result of the war, and a tour to the Grand Army of the Republic Memorial and internments of Union Veterans of the War at Fresno's Mountain View Cemetery, led by G.A.R. historian Fred Bohmfalk of Elk Grove.

Bloody Shenandoah, narrated by Burgess Meredith, will be shown at approximately 9 p.m. following the Keynote Address after dinner on Saturday the 8th. Hundreds of books will be for sale, information about a tour of the Shenandoah Valley in 2009 will be available, and civil war artifacts and weaponry will be displayed.

Preservation Report Good News; Bad News

Bad news first...the first article is an editorial regarding development at Cedar Creek, and the second reports news of a grant for Shiloh. (*Both articles have been edited for space.*)

"Why Belle Grove Plantation and Cedar Creek Battlefield Matter" by Richard Moe and Anne Buettner Winchester Star 09/04/2008 <u>http://www.winchesterstar.com/</u>

Virginia's historic Belle Grove Plantation and Cedar Creek Battlefield are under threat from an international corporation's rush to expand mining operations in the middle of some of the nation's most hallowed ground.

The plantation is a National Historic Landmark and... an essential element of a National Heritage Area and a National Historical Park . As for Cedar Creek, the National Park Service's American Battlefield Protection Program considers it "one of the most important Civil War battlefields in Virginia and in the nation."...These places (Belle Grove and Cedar Creek) are tangible links with the history of the Shenandoah Valley – from its early settlement and agricultural development to its pivotal role in the brother-against-brother bloodshed of the Civil War. In short, these places matter.

But now Carmeuse Lime & Stone, a Belgium-based mining conglomerate, wants to triple the size of its industrial operation at the Middletown Quarry, immediately adjacent to Belle Grove and the National Park. On May 28, Frederick County approved the quarry expansion plan...The quarry is located outside the National Park boundaries, but the American Battlefield Protection Program has confirmed that it actually occupies part of the 6,200-acre core battlefield where men in blue and gray fought and died in the autumn of 1864... Carmeuse's quarry expansion is vigorously opposed by a broad coalition of public agencies and private organizations – including not only the National Trust for Historic Preservation and Belle Grove, Inc., but also APVA – Preservation Virginia, the National Park Service, the National Parks Conservation Association, Preserve Frederick, the Shenandoah Valley Battlefields Foundation, the Shenandoah Valley Network, and the Virginia Department of Historic Resources... The radical quarry expansion is opposed also by 20 homeowners who have sued Frederick County to protect their private property. On Friday, Aug. 29, the National Trust for Historic Preservation filed a motion with the Circuit Court of Frederick County asking to join the homeowners' lawsuit...

We do not seek to shut the quarry down. However, in order for us to support any expansion of the quarry's operations, careful impact analysis must be completed and the necessary protections put in place. We will not cede our commitment to preserve Belle Grove Plantation and the Cedar Creek Battlefield for posterity.

Gov. Phil Bredesen joined state and local leaders at the Shiloh National Park Monday to award a transportation

enhancement grant totaling \$1 million for Phase 1 of the preservation and interpretation of the Battle of Shiloh in

Hardin and McNairy counties, according to a press release.

The grant funds will be used to acquire additional areas of the battlefield at both Shiloh and Fallen Timbers, properties considered to be in the core and study area of the battlefield...

"The Battle of Shiloh site is not just an important piece of Tennessee history, it is one of the most significant battlefields in the nation," Bredesen said... "It is imperative that we preserve these areas and I'm pleased the state can contribute to those efforts."

State Rep. Randy Rinks, D-Savannah, stated, "This battlefield draws visitors from around the nation and has a positive impact on the economies of both Hardin and McNairy counties. This is an important investment in preserving our nation's history for future generations."

"The preservation of this battlefield will ensure that future visitors will learn about this pivotal point in the Civil War and how this battle had a direct impact on the course of American history," said state Sen. John Wilder, D-Mason... "This grant will allow us to acquire and interpret some of the most endangered Civil War battlefield property in Tennessee ," said Fred Prouty, director of programs for the Tennessee Wars Commission. "We're thrilled to be able to partner as co-applicants with the Civil Wars Preservation Trust and utilize this grant to protect these significant sites for future generations."

The grant is made possible through a federally funded program administered by the Tennessee Department of Transportation.

The federal grant program was established by Congress in the early 1990's to fund activities designed to strengthen the cultural, aesthetic and environmental aspects of the nation's transportation system.
