Historian

Jefferson Davis

- Served as only president of the Confederate States from 1861 to 1865
- Represented Mississippi in the Senate and House of Representatives as a member of the Democratic Party before the American Civil War
- Had served as Secretary of War under President Franklin Pierce.
- Youngest of ten children, born in Fairview, Kentucky; grew up in Wilkinson County, Mississippi, and lived in Louisiana
- Bother Joseph Emory Davis secured Davis's appointment to West Point
- After graduating, served six years as a lieutenant in the United States Army; fought in Mexican War as colonel of volunteer regiment
- Before the Civil War, operated in Mississippi a large cotton plantation and owned as many as 113 slaves
- Argued against secession in 1858, he believed the states had an unquestionable right to leave the Union.
- Davis married Sarah Knox Taylor, daughter of general and future President Zachary Taylor; both soon contracted malaria, and Sarah died after three months of marriage
- Davis recovered slowly; had recurring bouts of illness throughout his life
- Married again, to 18-year-old Varina Howell; Had six children.
- When the Confederacy was defeated in 1865, Davis was captured, accused of treason, and imprisoned at Fort Monroe was never tried and was released after two years.
- Despite rumors to contrary, Davis was not captured wearing female clothing.
- Citizenship restored in 1978 by President Jimmy Carter

Civil War Almanac This Day in the Civil War History: Apr 25

1861: Troops from New York, Massachusetts and Rhode Island finally arrive in Washington, after their encounter with the rowdies in Baltimore. Meanwhile in the west, Capt. Stokes of Illinois and his troops succeed in taking away over 10 thousand muskets from the St Louis Missouri arsenal, before the rebels find out. Meanwhile in Richmond, Thomas J Jackson is unhappy at being appointed to a desk job as Major of Engineers. In California, Brigadier Gen Edwin Sumner replaces Col Albert Sidney Johnston as Commander in the West.

1862: Flag Officer Farragut arrives in the captured city of New Orleans. The mayor of New Orleans protests he has no authority to surrender the city, but this no longer matters. New Orleans will be held by Union forces until the end of the war. Meanwhile, Fort Macon near Beaufort North Carolina surrenders after bombardment by the troops of John G Park

1863: The British Parliament loudly debates the seizure of British vessels by American cruisers enforcing the blockade. There are skirmishes near Hard Times Landing Mississippi, Fort Bowie Arizona Territory, Greenland Gap West Virginia, and Webber's Falls Indian Territory

1864: Fighting at Marks' Mills and Moro Bottom in Arkansas, and at Cotile Landing on the Red River in Louisiana. In Tennessee, Federals begin a 3 days' expedition from Bull's Gap to the Watauga River. Gen Sherman sends a request to Fleet Capt Pennock in Cairo to protect Sherman's lines of communication, since Sherman's supply lines along the Tennessee River will be exposed when Sherman campaigns in Georgia

1865: The Lincoln funeral train begins the journey to Albany New York. Federal cavalry rapidly close in on John Wilkes Booth and his accomplice David Herold, at the Richard Garrett farm in Virginia. Gen Joseph Johnston asks Gen Sherman to renew negotiations, since President Johnson has rejected the original surrender agreement between Sherman and Johnston.
