This Month in Civil War History: April

<u>1861</u>: Confederate forces fire upon Fort Sumter, South Carolina. The Civil War formally begins.

<u>1862</u>: The Battle of Shiloh (Pittsburg Landing), the first major battle in Tennessee.

<u>1863</u>: Federal forces in the east begin a new campaign in Virginia to flank Lee's Army of Northern Virginia at Fredericksburg.

<u>1864</u>: Battle of Sabine Crossroads or Mansfield, Louisiana, the first major battle of the Red River Campaign in Louisiana.

<u>1865</u>: President Abraham Lincoln is assassinated by actor John Wilkes Booth at Ford's Theater in Washington, DC.

Person of the Month: Abraham "Blowed to Freedom

- The 3rd Louisiana Redan
 - Union forces continue to dig a new mine
 - Confederates dig a counter mine but don't want to risk white southern
 - 8 slaves, including Abraham, are forced to dig the counter mine
 - July 1 Union mine explodes killing 7 instantly
 - Abraham however blown into air 150 feet landing behind Union lines with only minor injuries
 - Asked by a Union soldier how high he thought he had gone. Abraham replied, slightly stunned, "About three miles!"
 - He becomes a celebrity
 - Union soldiers who rescued him put up tent/installed Abraham, wearing slave rags which further deteriorated due to the bomb blast

- For the remaining few days of the Vicksburg Campaign, the men charged their fellow soldiers a few cents admission to see the slave who was literally "blowed to Freedom."
- He recovered from his ordeal, got new clothes, and remained with the Union troops, eventually becoming a cook on General James McPherson's staff

<u>Historian</u>

1st Alabama Cavalry Regiment (Union)

- The 1st Alabama Cavalry Regiment was a cavalry regiment recruited from Southern Unionists that served in the Union Army during the American Civil War
- It was the only predominantly white Union regiment from Alabama
- Of the 2,678 white Alabamians who enlisted in the Union Army, 2,066 served in the 1st Alabama Cavalry
