This Month in Civil War History: November

<u>1861:</u> President Lincoln appoints General George B. McClellan as General-in-Chief of all United States armies

<u>1862:</u> North Carolina native Richard J. Gatling patents his new rapid-fire weapon, a 6 barrel machine gun. The Union forces use a few of them before the war ends. Ironically, and in common with other inventors of new weapons, Gatling believes his terrible new killing machine will discourage

warfare. His name will become the source of the gangster slang expression "gat" for gun..

<u>1863:</u> Siege of Knoxville, Tennessee. Confederate troops under General Longstreet lay siege to Knoxville held by Federal forces under General Ambrose Burnside. Longstreet finally attacks on November 30 but is repulsed with heavy losses. The arrival of US reinforcements forces him to withdraw to Greeneville, Tennessee, where his corps will spend the winter.. <u>1864:</u> Abraham Lincoln was reelected to a second term as U.S. President, defeating Democrat George B. McClellan.

Event of the Month: March to the Sea: Nov 15-Dec 21, 1864 (Jim Rhetta)

- Debilitated the Confederacy and helped lead to its collapse.
- Sherman's decision to operate deep within enemy territory without supply lines was unusual for its time.
- "Hard War" regarded as early example of "Total War" in modern times

March Preparations

- Only the most physically fit men were accepted; 1% left behind.
- Eighty percent were long-time veterans of campaigns
- Each unit had a supply train; size strictly limited.
- Each regiment had one wagon and one ambulance.
- Each company had one pack mule for the baggage of its officers
- The number of tents was curtailed
- The 62,000 men assembled:
 - 55,000 infantry,
 - 5,000 cavalry,
 - 2,000 artillerymen manning 64 guns 768 horses
 - Divided into two columns for the march

The Staff Work

- Rations for 62,000 for 20 days at 3lbs a day = 1,860 tons of food
- 7,000 horses and mules at 22lbs of fodder per day = 1,540 tons of fodder
- 3,400 tons of food required
- 6,000 pairs of spare shoes

Sherman's Special Field Orders

- The army will forage liberally on the country during the march
- Power to destroy mills, houses, cotton-gins, &c.
- General Principles:
 - In districts and neighborhoods where the army is unmolested, no destruction of such property should be permitted;
 - Should guerrillas attack or inhabitants burn bridges, obstruct roads, or hostility, relentless devastation authorized

- Horses, mules, wagons, &c., belonging to the inhabitants, the cavalry and artillery may appropriate freely and without limit, discriminating between the rich and the poor or industrious
- Foraging parties may take mules or horses to replace their own
- Refrain from abusive/threatening language, give written certificates of the facts, but no receipts

Living off the Land

• Sherman used livestock/crop production data from 1860 US census to lead troops through areas best for foraging

The March Impacts

- Wrecked 300 miles of railroad/numerous bridges/miles of telegraph lines.
- Seized 5,000 horses, 4,000 mules, and 13,000 head of cattle.
- Confiscated 9.5 million pounds of corn, 10.5 million pounds of fodder.
- Destroyed uncounted cotton gins and mills.

Assessments

- In 1929, British military historian B. H. Liddell Hart described the men of Sherman's army as "probably the finest army of military 'workmen' the modern world has seen. An army of individuals trained to look after their own food and health, to march far and fast with the least fatigue, to fight with the least exposure, above all, to act swiftly and to work thoroughly."
- After his surrender to Sherman, Confederate General Johnston said of Sherman's men that "there has been no such army since the days of Julius Caesar."

Historian
